

Post Census Corrections for the Bi-State Region

The **Decennial Census** is the official federal count of U.S. population occurring in 10-year increments, as required by Article I of the U.S. Constitution.

The **Count Question Resolution Program (CQR)** is an administrative review program to handle external challenges to decennial census counts. The program deals specifically with challenges to housing units (and persons residing therein) and group quarters population. The corrected counts may be used by all government entities for any programs requiring official Census 1990 or 2000 data. *However, the base data for the 1990 or 2000 Census are not revised according to the CQR changes. Therefore, none of the standard Census 1990 or 2000 data products reflect these corrections.*

A community may choose to use the Census Bureau's **Census 1990 or 2000 Special Tabulation Program**, which provides data users with the option to have custom tabulations created from decennial census data on a cost-reimbursable basis. This program was created to fulfill the needs of data users that are not met by standard data products, such as the summary files. Special tabulations vary in size, complexity, and cost, depending on the needs of the sponsoring client.

Corrected Counts for the Bi-State Region from the 1990 and 2000 Census Question Resolution (CQR) and Special Tabulation Programs are provided on page 2 of this document.

A **Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA)** is a geographic entity defined by the federal Office of Management and Budget for use by federal statistical agencies, based on the concept of a core area with a large population nucleus, plus adjacent communities having a high degree of economic and social integration with that core. The Quad Cities MSA is officially titled, *Davenport-Moline-Rock Island IA-IL Metropolitan Statistical Area*. For the past several decades the federally set MSA boundary for this area included all of Henry and Rock Island Counties in Illinois; and all of Scott County in Iowa. In the summer of 2003, the Office of Management and Budget added Mercer County Illinois to the Davenport-Moline-Rock Island IA-IL MSA. *This change occurred after the 2000 Census and is not reflected in Census 2000 data products.*

- **The Census 2000 official population for the Davenport-Moline-Rock Island IA-IL MSA is 359,062.**
- **The addition of Mercer County's Census 2000 population brings the total to 376,019.**

Bi-State Regional Commission Census Data Policy: Bi-State Regional Commission will attempt to issue corrected Census Counts for geographies in the Bi-State Region, for which these numbers are applicable. Otherwise, Bi-State Regional Commission will issue base data from the decennial censuses. These base data sets do not include changes from the Count Question Resolution Program or other post census boundary changes. Totals for geographies larger than counties use base Census data, unless otherwise noted.
